Four of the properties are situated on Market Place, the large, medieval square that lies at the centre of the town. Two more stand on Castlegate, which adjoins Market Place immediately to the southwest. A further four are located on Barbeck, a quiet residential street just 400m to the east.

The properties are of varying designs and archetypes but all can boast convenient central locations. Moreover, they are part of a town that, itself, has an exceptionally attractive position, surrounded by some of the UK's most popular rural attractions and National Parks.

Ideal for both long- and short-stay tenants, the apartments are all being subjected to extensive refurbishment and modernisation works. For investors who seek off-plan prices and a proven record of rental demand, they make for a very exciting opportunity.

# marketplace

Market Place is undoubtedly the commercial and cultural centre of Thirsk.

Large and open, it is lined with shops, cafes and other popular amenities, and in its structure and architecture, it offers many clues to its medieval past.

It encompasses a hotel, which has served patrons since Tudor times, and numerous other historic buildings that go back hundreds of years. It pays tribute to this long heritage by hosting weekly open-air markets – a tradition that dates to the twelfth century.

It also bears testament to more recent history. A notable example is its Clock Tower, which was erected in 1896 to mark the wedding of the Duke of York and Princess May of Teck, who would later become King George V and Queen Mary. Literary fans will also note a number of shops and inns whose names emphasise the town's ties to the author Alf Wight, a country vet who lived and worked in Thirsk, and who wrote an immensely popular series of tales under his pen name 'James Herriot'

# **APARTMENTS**

Investors can choose between four apartments on Market Place. They are all located above a retail premises in the northeastern corner of the square and they overlook Market Place itself. These are lovely period properties with many original features including covings and fireplaces, and they possess an abundance of character.

Being located directly on Market Place, the properties do not come with dedicated parking spaces. However, those living here can use the town's free residents' parking zones, which are conveniently located.

# **APARTMENTS**

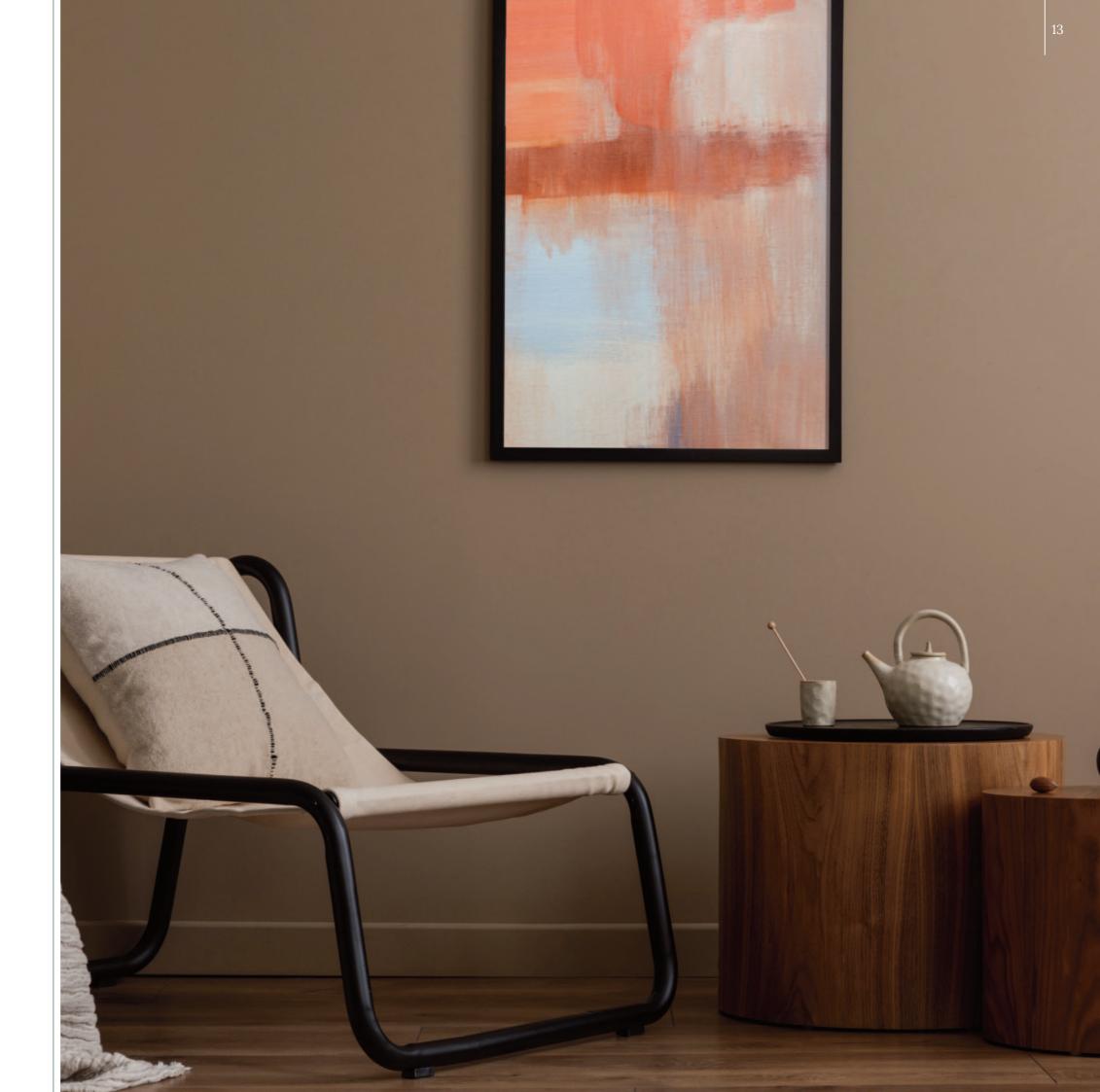
The A61 runs east-west through the centre of Market Place, flanked on both sides by ample parking. But just a short way to the west, it becomes Castlegate. This short, winding section of road lies right on the edge of the market square and its various properties maintain the same sense of heritage.

The properties themselves include a church, several businesses and a number of residential apartments set above the retail floors. At the road's southern end it turns again to become Westgate and here, at that junction, stands a local cinema.

It is on Castlegate that two of our own apartments are located and, for tenants, they offer an attractive mix of town-centre convenience and easy access to local transport networks. Suitable for both tourist visitors and long-term residents, they promise an enduring appeal and reliable rental demand.

Both properties have one designated car parking space each, and there are a further two visitor spaces on site.









Cross the Finkle Street Bridge over Cod Beck, heading eastwards towards the A61 roundabout, and you'll quickly come to Barbeck, a quiet residential street that runs southeast towards the A19.

Its nearest end lies less than 350m from Market Place, making the town centre easily accessible on foot.

Properties here may not feel quite so deeply immersed in English history as they do on Market Place but, for tenants seeking a convenient location and all the benefits of a modern refurbishment, the four houses will be hard to beat.

Each house has one designated car parking space, and there are a further two visitor spaces on site.

The ten properties are intended very specifically to appeal to discerning tenants and short-stay visitors who will pay more for elegant accommodation in an attractive and historic community. That intention has shaped the design of their refurbishment and the way that they are now being decorated and fitted out.

The appeal to long-staying tenants is further underscored by the proximity of numerous well-regarded educational establishments. For tenants with pre-school and school-age children, there are several good choices in the area, and at distances that won't make the school run a serious chore.

# h s g supply

As a small town, surrounded by greenbelt, Thirsk is understandably limited in terms of its ability to provide new land for housing development. As in so many other parts of Britain, this has given rise to a wide gap between supply and demand. There are many more potential tenants than there are properties available, so there is considerable competition to secure a good one.

In Thirsk, the shortfall is exacerbated by the town's popularity as a base for tourism. Many landlords choose to let their properties out in the lucrative short-stay market rather than as homes under Assured Shorthold Tenancy agreements. This inevitably leads to even more intense competition in the residential lettings market.

In short, whichever market investors choose to target, strong rental demand is all but certain.





Data from ONS show that between the Censuses of 2011 and 2021, the local population grew by +6.2%, from 6,663 to 7,074. In absolute terms, that might not sound like a big leap but in a small community, it's important; it means added pressure on an already strained housing market.

Looking ahead, the gulf between supply and demand looks set to widen still further. ONS reports that across the wider borough of Hambleton, the population is expected to rise by another 700 before the end of 2025.

As a result of limited supply, growing demand and other market forces, investors with property in Thirsk have enjoyed some excellent returns.

# æ ic growth

In any given area, conditions for property investors are at least partially dependent upon the state of the regional economy. A buoyant economy tends to imply growth in both employment and average earnings – and these, in turn, have a direct bearing on average disposable incomes. Generally speaking, the stronger the economy, the better able local people will be to deal with affordability pressures. Over time, this should support faster growth in both capital and rental values.

In Thirsk and its surrounds, there are encouraging economic signs. The region already benefits from a thriving tourist market but it is also seeing steady growth in high-value sectors such as advanced manufacturing and life sciences.

Moreover, there are new infrastructure projects now in progress that will reshape a number of local communities. In July 2024, for example, York and North Yorkshire Combined Authority approved a £10 million budget for a four-year scheme to redevelop the region's high streets using funding from a broader £540 million devolution deal.



Other funds now given approval in principle include £10 million for the region's 'Carbon Negative Challenge', £5 million for a Business Innovation Fund, and an expected £2.5 million for a Skills Innovation Fund. These and other initiatives have the potential to attract new private sector investment and should give a further boost to local employment and earnings.

Thirsk makes an attractive location for tourist visitors and for those with jobs in the area. Unlike many rural communities, the town is also well connected to the national road and rail networks.

#### PRIVATE VEHICLES

Residents on Market Place can use the town's free residents' parking zones, which are conveniently located. Those on Castlegate have one dedicated space per apartment, as do those on Barbeck, who can also take advantage of free roadside parking.

In all cases, the main roads – the A61 and A170 – are immediately accessible. They enable speedy links to the A19 bypass, which skirts the eastern edge of town and runs north to Middlesbrough. They also link to the A168, which extends southwest to junction 49 of the A1(M) motorway. The A61 itself also connects to the A1(M), at junction 50, which lies approximately 9km to the southwest.

#### **BUSES**

Local buses run from Market Place to nearby towns and cities, including York, Ripon and Northallerton. Direct coach services run daily to London and other UK cities.







#### **RAIL**

Thirsk Railway Station lies just outside of town, roughly 2km to the west along the A61. It sits on the East Coast Main Line and is easily accessible via local bus and coach services. From here, commuters can board services run by Grand Central Rail and TransPennine Express. They offer direct connections to key destinations such as Manchester Airport, Sunderland, Newcastle and London Kings Cross. Journeys to London take approximately two hours and do not require any changes.

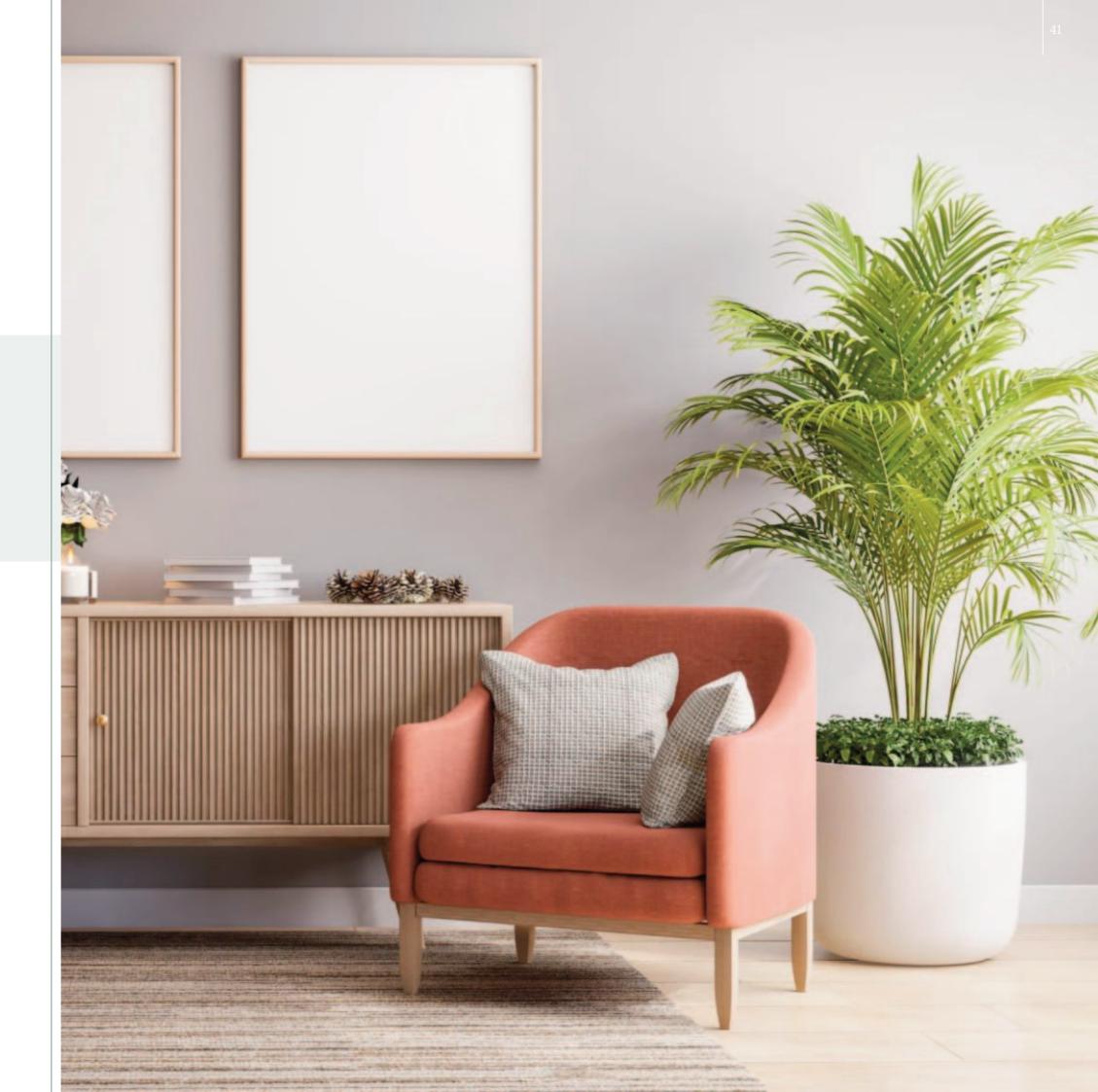

Internally, light, natural colours will be used on walls, doors and ceilings. On the more historic properties, numerous period features will be retained to preserve their character, but kitchens and bathrooms will be fitted with attractive modern appliances.

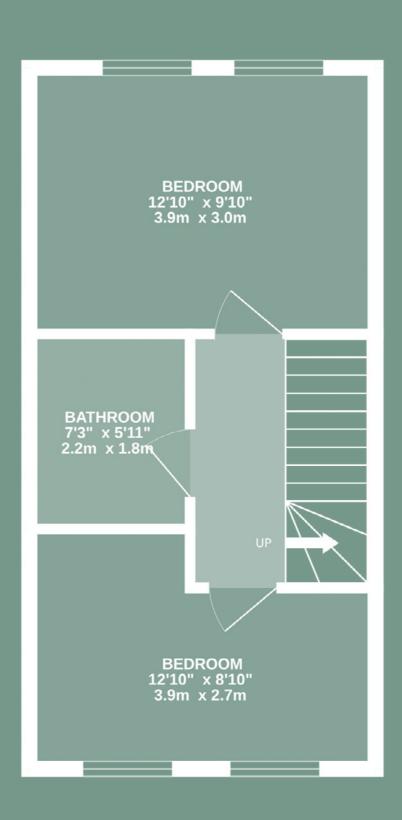
From the landing, stairs rise further to a large attic bedroom.

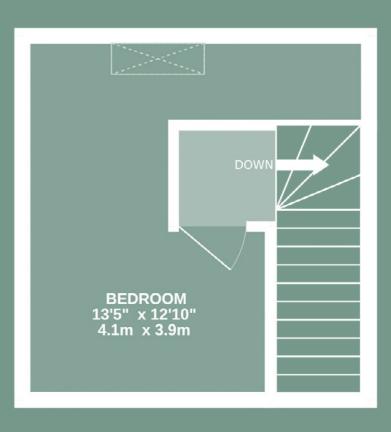

This stylish first floor apartment features an entrance hall with storage, and doors to all other parts of the home. These include a bathroom, two bedrooms and a large, open-plan living room/dining room. It is fitted with dormer windows and rooflights, which give the property a light, airy feel. All parts of the property are now being refurbished and re-fitted to a high modern standard.

Prices range between £180,000 and £260,000 according to the size and specification of the individual properties.

The Market Place property has a flying freehold and each flat will receive a quarter share. For Castlegate, the freehold is not available. For Barbeck, the freehold is included.

In order to offer investors complete security and peace of mind, all deposits are lodged and retained in escrow by solicitors. No funds are released as shown below to developer before completion.

Investors will be required to make a £5,000 payment to secure their chosen property. This fee will be held by the developer's solicitors and will form part of the purchase price.







# Sul ary

These ten properties in Thirsk offer a twofold appeal to investors. They can be let to the under-supplied residential market, or to the generally lucrative short-stay tourist market. In both cases, rental demand is intense and, accordingly, the area has seen strong, inflation-beating growth in capital values and rental incomes. Average yields, too, have been very impressive.

Whichever market the investor favours, there is ample evidence of robust demand.

In the longer-term AST market, ongoing growth in the local population and the regional economy should both help to drive demand ever higher. So too should the ongoing modernisation of the properties, which will help to raise them to new levels of energy efficiency.

Likewise, the regional tourist economy is booming. Visitor numbers have been climbing steadily since 2019 when the Covid pandemic marked the start of the UK 'staycation' boom. Now, demand for good quality tourist accommodation is strong and reliable, with especially high rates of occupancy during a long peak season.

The properties vary considerably in size and design, offering investors a wide choice of options.
